Every single person in the room stood quietly, respectfully, at attention. Completely silent — not a single cough or whisper from the 500 people present. Four Marines marched in formation, entering the room with the flag of the United States of America.

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This was the way the 19th annual Military Ball opened, as presented by the Pierre Claeyssens Veterans Foundation. The ballroom at Fess Parker's Doubletree Resort was filled with soldiers and their spouses, as well as veterans from World War II, the Korean War, Vietnam War, Gulf War, Iraq and Afghanistan.

The ball was founded by Pierre
Claeyssens, a grateful Belgian
immigrant who survived the horrors of
World War I as a child, thanks to the U.S. efforts
overseas and the Hoover Food Administration.
Pierre never forgot his heroes — the American
soldiers. At the age of 88, Pierre organized the
Military Ball, inviting every veteran in Santa
Barbara and personally picking up the tab for
all the dinners.

Since Pierre's passing, the Military Ball — unique in our country — has been under the auspices of the Veterans Foundation, named in Pierre's honor and founded by **John** and **Hazel Blankenship**, who both served in Vietnam. They presented a wonderfully rousing program.

Every branch of military was seen proudly

in uniform — Marines, Navy, Army, Air Force, Coast Guard and Merchant Marines. At one point in the program when the appropriate theme song was played, each branch stood up and waved, amid cheers or cheerful jeers (you know, that Navy-Marines rivalry thing).

John Blankenship, executive director of the foundation, welcomed the crowd, which included Brigadier General Fred Lopez; World War II vets Silvio Di Loreto and Arthur Petersen (Screaming

Eagles of the 101st Airborne Division), with his wife, Gloria; Hap and Bonnie DeSimone; Alice Robles; Peter Hilf; Julia Sian and Bill Kehoe; David Gonzales; and Kathy Butts and her son, Phillip. Also present were Pierre Claeyssens' daughter, Noelle Burkey, and grandchildren, Jenna and Brett Burkey, as well as Venesa

Faciane, Shelby Hughes and Anna Villegas. Army veteran Peter Bie served as our excellent emcee and paid special tribute to the other Vietnam veterans.


Sheriff Bill Brown, board member of the Pierre Claeyssens Veterans Foundation, presented the Greatest Generation Award to Santa Barbara's own Tuskegee airman, CMSgt. Art Hicks, amid a standing ovation.

The evening's keynote speaker was U.S. Army Sgt. Sammy L. Davis. The decorated soldier (Medal of Honor, Silver Star and two Purple Hearts) was the inspiration for the movie "Forrest Gump," and he sounded much like Sergeant York.

He talked about lessons on life from the war, and how to find solace — playing "Shenandoah" brought "peace to my soul and strengthened my heart."

"I did not go to war because I wanted to kill. I went because I loved my father and wanted to make him proud, and because I loved my grandfather and what he fought for, because I love my country ..."

"God bless, take care of one another. We must desperately put 'We the People' back into this notion"
